In the first three months that it has been my privilege to be your national chairman there have been two significant events that promise to shape the future of our association and the inland waterway system. The AWCC constitution has been amended to allow waterway groups with common interests and aims to our own to formally join the association. I believe this will strengthen our cause and widen our interest whilst ensuring that the association remains firmly under the control of its boat clubs. The new constitution was formally adopted during the National Executive meeting held on the 25th June at Watch House Cruising Club.



AWCC has submitted a detailed response to the DEFRA Consultation on the New Waterways Charity. We support the transfer of British Waterways to the NWC and look forward to the future integration of those rivers currently under Environmental Agency control. We have made the point that sufficient funding and careful management will be essential for success particularly in the early years. We look forward to working with all parties towards a successful unified inland waterway system with the secure future that it deserves.

I hope to have the opportunity to visit all regions this year to better understand the needs of the club boater across the association. AWCC is your association and I would like to hear your views at a time when our boating comes under ever increasing external pressure. AWCC is fifty years old in 2014 and although that seems a long way off the NEC is starting to consider how to mark the anniversary. We would welcome suggestions from members for an appropriate celebration.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the work of my predecessor David Pearce. David has worked tirelessly over many years, representing and promoting AWCC at all levels of external meetings and events. We have the continued benefit of David's experience as he stays with us as Parliamentary Officer with particular interest in the New Waterways charity.

FIRE SAFETY RELATED TO STOVE INSTALLATIONS

Midlands regional Chairman Graham Myatt forwarded the pictorial info overleaf which was supplied by Graham Watts BSS Manager. There have been concerns raised that the greatest BSS failure rate is in 4 year old boats. He also supplied the following advice regarding solid fuel fires:

- Boat fires and carbon monoxide poisonings attributed to solid fuel stoves continue to feature in BSS incident report data.
- The BSS welcomes the introduction of the BSI code and encourages boaters adding solid fuel stoves or replacing existing stoves to install to it using a competent installer.
- The BSS has no plans to make installation to the new code a BSS mandatory requirement - retrospective or otherwise.
- The BSS considers that installation to the code is essential for added safety, but equally important is the way the is used and maintained.
- The BSS is to shortly issue a news release and briefings promoting new and replacement installations to the code and providing a link to essential safety messages concerning having an effective /flue maintenance regime and taking care and being attentive during use.

Boat owners should remain vigilant to the key hazards presented by solid fuel stoves – over-firing leading to a boat fire, and carbon monoxide poisoning due to the escape of flue gases into the cabin – visit the BSS fire portal for safety information http://www.boatsafetyscheme.com/site/FirePortal_216.asp

AWCC would advise members to ensure the following in respect of fire safety for their boats both in construction and later installations:

If you are having a new boat built ensure that the building contract includes full compliance with the Boat Safety Certificate scheme.

Ensure that you use a qualified fitter and the installation complies with BS 8511: 2010 'Code of practice for the installation of solid fuel heating and cooking appliances in small craft'.

Fit suitable smoke alarms to your boat—detailed info can be found online at http://www.boatsafetyscheme.com/site/FirePortal_216.asp

If you are fitting a Carbon Monoxide alarm ensure that it meets the updated EN 50291 standard by checking the data sheet or user manual and choosing an alarm that has the greater usable temperature and humidity range or that it states that the alarm is suitable for boats.

STOVES IN BOATS

Some of the basics about fitting and using solid fuel stoves on boats in the UK and Ireland.

The numbers in (brackets) are sections in *British Standard BS 8511:2010 Code of practice for the installation of solid fuel heating and cooking appliances in small craft* where much more detailed information can be found. The code isn't compulsory, but will always be referred to if an accident occurs.

A good stove will follow the rules here and:

- Be recommended by the manufacturer for use in boats.
- Be installed by a competent person. (5.2)
- ... strictly to the maker's instructions
- Be the right size for the space to be heated.
- Have securely latching doors which can't jolt open.
- Use very dry wood or smokeless fuels. Avoid bituminous coal (called 'housecoal' or 'Polish coal')
- Have chimney and flueways cleaned very regularly.
- Have door seals, windows and liners kept sound.
- If your stove has a lower ash door which can be opened separately from the main door – take very great care, leaving it open can make the fire burn far too fiercely, a common cause of serious boat fires.

- > Choose an insulated flue pipe to make the smoke rise
- > Make sure enough fresh air is coming in.
- > Keep anything flammable well away.


STOVE SITED where it won't cause obstruction, particularly to escape routes or near steps. (5.1)

WELL AWAY FROM COMBUSTIBLES ...anything like wood, GRP, fuel, gas containers, oil, candles, curtains, cushions, clothing, books, oil lamps, fold-away furnishings or anything which could create a fire hazard – all as far away as the stove maker says is safe, usually about 600mm away or behind a Protection Panel. (5.1)

HEAT PROTECTION PANELS

Stoves and uninsulated flue pipes can easily get hot enough to set fire to paint, wood or other combustibles a distance away. A single fireproof panel fastened straight to a wall is no use – heat can pass straight through it.

One way of making a good protection panel is to have: a 10mm air gap (can be supported on offsets of fireboard or tiles screwed though at the corners), then 25mm thick calcium silicate board (which can be tiled) then at least a 45mm gap to the stove body, all extending at least 200mm above the stove. (7) Topped by a 15mm cement-board panel, this construction can be used as the hearth underneath a stove with legs.



South East region

The Association of Nene River Clubs held its annual rally on the May bank holiday weekend with more than 80 boats plus campers & caravans attending. This coincided with Crick Show which at which the AWCC stall was supported by several Executive



team members.

The 250 year anniversary of the Nene navigation continues with various celebra-

tions (see box on right) with the purpose of publicising the river and river activities.

ANRC is seeking to secure bankside moorings along the river and is in the process of contacting prospective landowners who may be interested in leasing land.

Thrupp Canal Cruising Club newsletter 'Wide Views' reports club efforts working with BW to encourage volunteering along the Oxford Canal. The club already works to maintain the environment and provides mooring wardens assisting with monitoring overstays and licence evasion.



February 6th 2012 sees the **Diamond Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II**. As part of the celebrations of her 60 years on the throne a flotilla of 1000 boats will sail on the Thames,

headed by her Majesty on a specially commissioned barge. This is planned for Sunday 3rd June, 6 weeks before the start of the London Olympic games. At the National AGM on April 16th the AWCC Technical Adviser and Commodore of St Pancras Cruising Club, Andrew Phasey, suggested that it would be good if each member club of the AWCC could get a boat into the flotilla. We are advised that it will not be necessary to purchase an EA extra river licence if boaters moor above Town lock on the Northampton arm town moorings. More Reports from the Regions, club news & upcoming events

North East Region

Recognising his wealth of experience Alan Hodgkinson was approached, and has agreed to be the region's President for an initial period of 3 years.

The new Chairman of the region, Bob Mennell, has requested regular updates from the National Executive to the regions in respect of its national dialogue with the government and BW.

Feedback from clubs and individuals on the DEFRA consultation has been advised by the region.

Concerns have been expressed about apparent lack of action by BW on significant safety matters reported last year. At least one serious accident has occurred due to the state of the landing stage at White Rose Boat Club.

Local residents have been consulted about the environment at Bingley Five Rise locks but boating clubs were not contacted. Follow up queries made by the Chairman have finally been passed on to Wigan.

White Rose Boat Club and Retford & Worksop Boat Club are holding rallies in September (see notices right).

Midlands region

Howard Smith has been unanimously agreed as Region President under the new AWCC constitution.

The region still does not have a Quartermaster and needs to elect a new Chairman next year as Graham Myatt has advised that he will not be standing for election in 2012.

BSS advisory code of practice for fitting of solid fuel stoves has been highlighted (see page 4 - 5). An examiner has advised that he did not see any compliant with the advice at Crick show this year.

The region committee also believes that Carbon Monoxide alarms should be a requirement of the BSS.

Concerns expressed about apparent reduction in the number of BW pumpout facilities. It also appears that emergency call out procedures are being centralised by BW.

Black Buoy Boat Club in their newsletter "Buoy's Own" reported that a local boater had raised his concerns about the state of one of the local bridges with his Member of Parliament. The MP, no other than Caroline Spelman had subsequently visited the site with BW Chairman Tony Hales!

North West region reported that delegates attended BW user group forums but reported that their submitted written questions were not answered appearing to have been lost by BW.

The region had sent a letter to BWML about restricted access to services at BW Marina. The reply had advised that misuse and vandalism had forced a restriction on services.

The NW regional chair had attended the Federation of Bridgewater Clubs Rally on behalf of the AWCC (see front page). It was also attended by two local authority mayors and over 220 boats.

Notices written in several languages have been sited in the area following drainage of ponds possibly in attempts to catch fish.

North Cheshire Cruising Club in its newsletter "Ditchcrawler" reports a successful Easter Weekend 40 boat Cruise to Bugsworth Basin joined by 14 boats from Stoke and 6 from Tudor boat club.


My father was the editor of the first Coventry Canal Society newsletter and I spent many hours once a month, printing, folding and putting them into envelopes; my hands stained with blue ink.

Droitwich Canal Opening

The event was reported by IWA news as the "culmination of nearly forty years of community-led campaigning and volunteering to bring the canals back to their former glory". The Droitwich Canals Trust has been heavily involved in this project.

On July 1st a weekend of celebrations kicked off with a plaque unveiling ceremony by DEFRA minister, Caroline Spelman. The plaque commemorated the work of volunteers working for over 30 years on the project. It also featured a flotilla of boats and combined with Droitwich Spa Water & Music Festivals.

The canal links the Worcester and Birmingham canals. Boaters can now navigate 21 miles in the newly completed 'Mid Worcester Ring' which also includes the River Severn.

11th to 19th June saw the BCF's Mission along the Erewash Canal taking place. A dozen boats visited the canal and worked alongside local churches, schools, pubs and local organisations.

On Sunday 12th June we planned a walk along the canal tow path to the Lock Cottage (the headquarters of the ECPDA however torrential rain, high winds and quite bitter cold temperatures caused us to change from our planned relaxed canal side event, embracing tow path walkers, cyclists etc.

Instead we had a cosy, round the fire occasion, chatting and listening to our folk singers in the upstairs room. Members from the two local churches, a few young people who had attended the previous day's event on the Rec. and several Canal Society members braved the inclement weather conditions and enjoyed free cream teas. Many of the visitors had lived in Sandiacre most of their lives but said it was the first time they had visited the cottage. Many found it a very nostalgic visit, remembering the times when they washed using the copper, wash tub, dolly peg and mangle, or sat by the coal fire, feet on the rag rug reminiscing of years gone by.

Remaining jam, scones and cream were enjoyed later in the week when served to people enjoying the canalside ambience and the lovely clear water of the Erewash Canal.

However the Alert editor thinks that the "combined dimensions" of the first floor sitting room / kitchen are pretty generous at 20' x 7'2". Similar measurements feature in the ground floor bedroom and shower room.
